Who Visits the Centre?

Each year the Centre interacts with around 3,000 people of all ages and backgrounds. It provides programs in English, computer studies, life skills, driver education, specialist housing assistance, settlement assistance, a women's group and very popular youth sports and youth leadership training programmes, as well as leisure and cultural programmes.

Did you know that 60 students a day come to the Centre to participate in the Language for Living programme alone? 300 young people a month participate in programmes that include AFL, basketball, soccer, art classes and a highly successful local parks programme that encourages children to come and "have a go" at different sports. The program also transitions young people to mainstream sporting clubs through the assistance of the Kidsport initiative.

Difficult Times Mean Funding Cuts

However, these are difficult times for those of us helping new arrivals and vulnerable people in our society. Our funding from the State and Federal Governments has been severely cut and we are finding it harder and harder to maintain all our programs. Sadly, we have already had to let some of our staff go due to these cuts. Vital programmes like our English language classes and our "Women Together" group desperately need more funding.

It aims to foster positive relationships between young people from diverse communities and strengthen police engagement with the community by providing fun and structured soccer activities that target young people between 8-18 years of age.

Common Goal is a community initiative managed by Edmund Rice Centre WA in partnership with Football West, WA Police and the Mirrabooka Mosque. It also has the support of the City of Stirling and is funded by the Department of Sport and Recreation.
