Common Goal

Soccer Academy

An expansion of the Common Goal Soccer Academy was launched in Cannington on May 1st, building on the earlier success of the program launched in Mirrabooka 12 months ago. Common Goal uses soccer as a way of engaging youth from diverse backgrounds and provides leadership and other development opportunities. The program began in early February and has been building ever since. It currently boasts a juniors program, a female program and a youth academy.



After formalities, hosted by the Canning Mosque which included speeches from Senior Police, members of parliament and ERCWA Director Steve Bowman, and a reading from the Quran, it was on to business for the Academy team as they looked forward to their encounter with the WA Police soccer team at the Queens Park Primary School Oval.

This was an eagerly anticipated game by the players and their community, and they did themselves and everyone else present very proud, with an attacking brand of football that left the Police team constantly on the defensive. The Common Goal team broke through late in the first half to score the only goal of the game and held on for a 1-0 victory.

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Edmund Rice Centre WA's Director Steve Bowman said "The weekly Monday afternoon session here at Queen's Park is a time to make new and respectful friendships, build and strengthen partnerships and celebrate all that is good in our diverse multiculticultural community."

Common Goal is a partnership between the Edmund Rice Centre WA, Football West and WA Police and the Cannington chapter is supported by the Perth Turkish Youth Association, Canning Mosque, Queens Park Primary School, and the City of Canning.


Computer Training for Online Services

This program aims to teach students from CaLD communities basic computer skills in order to enable them to use online services including government services linked to myGov. The program started in February this year, with two teachers (Tia and Martha) running both individual and class sessions. It is funded by the Office of Multicultural Interests.

To date we have had a total of 36 registered clients, who have attended 43 classes and 18 individual sessions.

While we aim to teach students about a variety of services, the most popular requests by students have been how to navigate the Centrelink online services website and to access job search websites including Seek and Job Active. Students learn how to upload resumes and cover letters to these websites.


